

Tatiana Bredikin and Jefferson Regional Health Alliance Highlights, October 2021 through 2022

Learning communities provide a space and a structure for people to align around a shared goal. Effective communities are both aspirational and practical. They connect people, organizations, and systems that are eager to learn and work across boundaries.

Jefferson Regional Health Alliance (JRHA) is a cross-sector collaborative learning community of regional leaders working together to improve the health and health care resources of Southern Oregonians. Members of sometimes competing organizations are working together toward greater understanding and a higher end.

Outcomes and Deliverables

- Facilitated monthly executive committee meetings and quarterly board meetings in the transition after the departure of the managing director and through the COVID in-person restrictions.
- Created engaging and interactive Zoom meetings.
- Increased meeting attendance and participation.
- Interviewed Board members on their priorities and engagement culminating in an in-depth report. (This is an internal document and cannot be included here.)

JRHA Learning Community Dialogues

Peter Senge describes <u>dialogue</u> as "the free and creative exploration of complex and subtle issues, a deep 'listening' to one another and suspending of one's views."

- Drug Addiction Treatment and Recovery Act (previously Measure 110) dialogue with members
 of law enforcement, the courts, and service providers leading to a coordinated response to state
 representatives,
- Jackson County Community Crisis System Redesign,
- Medford Navigation Center, collaborative city/non-profit service center for those who are unhoused,
- Community Health Improvement Plan, Modernization Funding, structural changes,
- Candidates' forum, an opportunity for candidates and members to learn from one another.
- 1115 Medicaid Waiver and its impact on Oregonians, presenter/participants from the state, coordinated care organization, hospital, local government, and behavioral health.
